

Jeff Parker is a Portland, Oregon based writer and comic book artist. He worked as a storyboard artist on the television cartoon "Big Guy and Rusty the Boy Robot," and has written a number of Marvel Comics titles including, X-MEN: FIRST CLASS, AGENTS OF ATLAS and

THUNDERBOLTS. He is currently writing BATMAN 66' and AQUAMAN for DC Comics.

Jeff Parker's wonderful, irreverent series continues with issues 11-16. The Joker's Big Show - Catwoman and The Joker team up using a mind control device to force people to laugh. Harley Quinn also makes an appearance. The Queen of Diamonds' Big Heist - Marsha, The Queen of Diamonds is hunting for the world's biggest diamond. Turns out it's the famed Bat-Diamond in the Bat Cave. Marsha appeared in Marsha, Queen of Diamonds and Marsha's Scheme of Diamonds played by Carolyn Jones. She then returned in the episodes Penguin Is a Girl's Best Friend, Penguin Sets a Trend and Penguin's Disastrous End. To Be or Not to Be - Minstrel plans a devious trap for the Dynamic Duo. Minstrel appeared in The Minstrel's Shakedown and Barbecued Batman?. He was played by Van Johnson. Don't Change that Bat-Channel - A gritty new detective show called The Dark Knight Detective starts broadcasting on Bat-urday nights but the producer turns out to be a member of Batman '66's rogue's gallery. False-Face appeared in True or False-Face and Holy Rat Race. He was played by Malachi Throne. The Bat Robot Takes Flight - Batman has a Bat Robot created to fight crime in his absence but when the mechanical marvel faces off against The Joker and The Riddler he finds out there's no substitute for the original. Caught in the Widow's Web - The Penguin teams up with the Black Widow to destroy the dynamic duo. This is probably the weakest of the stories and was the one that was furthest from the mark when trying to reproduce the original television program. The Black Widow appeared in two episodes, Black Widow Strikes Again and Caught in the Spiders Den. She was played by Tallulah Bankhead. Eggolution - Egghead hatches a plan to eggsact revenge on Batman and Robin by dramatically eggselerating his own brain power giving him the power to control matter and change the dynamic duo into cro-magnon men. This is another story that would never appear in the Adam West television program but it's got a great ending and Jeff Parker was clearly having a blast with all the egg related puns so I'll give him a pass.

The best part is the story with Falseface's "dark knight detective" show. A subtle jab at Batman's modern incarnation.

I love the Batman TV series and these comics capture the feeling perfectly. When I read the first volume and saw they drew the Joker with a mustache covered in greasepaint I knew I was in the right place. Fun without being condescending.
