


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Malawi, 6th (Bradt Travel Guide)



Synopsis

This is the only standalone guidebook to the self-styled ‘Warm Heart of Africa’. Accessible, affordable and tranquil, Malawi is dominated by the scenic splendour of Lake Malawi, running for 500km through the Great Rift Valley. Elsewhere are numerous little-visited mountains, forests, game reserves and rock art sites. This updated covers everything from wildlife viewing and lakeshore idylls to the best lodgings and eateries for all budgets as well as several significant political changes. Important developments include the conversion of Majete Game Reserve to a fenced ‘Big Five’ reserve with a world class safari camp.

Philip Briggs is a travel writer specialising in Africa. Born in the UK and raised in South Africa, he first backpacked between Nairobi and Cape Town in 1986 and has been travelling the highways and byways of Africa ever since. Published in 1991, his Bradt Guide to South Africa was the first such guidebook to be published internationally after the release of Nelson Mandela. Over the rest of the 1990s, he wrote a series of pioneering Bradt Guides to destinations that were then - and in some cases still are - otherwise practically uncharted by the travel publishing industry. These included the first dedicated guidebooks to Tanzania, Uganda, Ethiopia, Malawi, Mozambique, Ghana and Rwanda (co-authored with Janice Booth). Philip has visited more than two dozen African

countries in total and written about most of them, whether it be for guidebook publishers or for specialist travel and wildlife magazines including Africa Birds & Birding, Africa Geographic, BBC Wildlife, Travel Africa and Wanderlust.

It's quite easy: If you go to Malawi - get this book. One can't lie by saying that it's the best travel guide dedicated solely on Malawi, as it's in fact the only one. Lonely Planet has one that covers Malawi together with Zambia and Mozambique, but if you don't also go to the other two countries there's no point in buying it. Regarding this specific book:- I think the content is VERY well researched and most information on hotels, restaurants and travel agencies proved to be accurate. The only comment for improvement I would have is that the structure of the regions is really confusing (you don't really need to separate such a small country in 30+ sub regions.) Potentially it would have been better to structure the book based on fewer but more comprehensive regions.

I haven't yet gotten to Malawi to give this guide the acid test, but it seems thorough and up-to-date regarding attractions and amenities. My one complaint is that the maps do not always correspond well with the text. For example, the text devotes several pages to the "Elephant Marsh," referring to it as a good place to view wildlife, but I have not found any map that shows where it is located. Similarly, important landmarks around Nyika National Park are mentioned in the text but are not shown on the maps. As a map-oriented person I find this disappointing.
