

I'm currently using this textbook for an anthropology class. I consider myself a dedicated, hardworking student and am very talented at learning anything based in history, anthropology, and any other study concerning human nature. But this textbook is incredibly difficult to follow if you pay any attention to detail. Here's a random paragraph I just read: "All over the highlands, pottery-using farmers established villages. Tehuacan Valley's Ajalpan phase, which followed upon the poorly understood initial ceramic Purron phase, showed evidence of a strong dependence upon domesticated food. In the Mixteca Alta region, Early-Cruz phase (1500-1200 BC) settlements were established at Etlatongo and Yucuita, sites that became important in later phases. Archaeological surveys in the Nochixtlan Valley and Tamazulapan Valley revealed a widespread pattern of small farming settlements, with simple buff-colored pottery." This is from Chapter 4. What did I just read? As another reviewer said, it seems like no one gave feedback on this textbook because only a Mesoamerican anthropologist could understand what is going on here. If this textbook has to tell the reader that maize is native to the Americas, it's clearly intended for newcomers. And a newcomer cannot keep track of the thousands of ultra-specific words and phrases that are dropped sparingly and with little context. If you are stuck with this book, you'll learn that scanning is equivalent to focused reading. Think light and strain to focus on the biggest picture. Read only one or two sentences per paragraph. Otherwise, you'll drown in the vast ocean of jargon that is this miserable

tome.
