

Very good for sporting activities, providing (what looks like) a complete list of all the surfing or sailing providers, restaurants, places to stay, etc. The restaurant guide to St. Thomas was very valuable on our first night there, It takes the confusion out of being the first night - we can still eat. I would have liked more in-depth cultural and historical essays, i.e. more about the resident population, or the arts scene.
