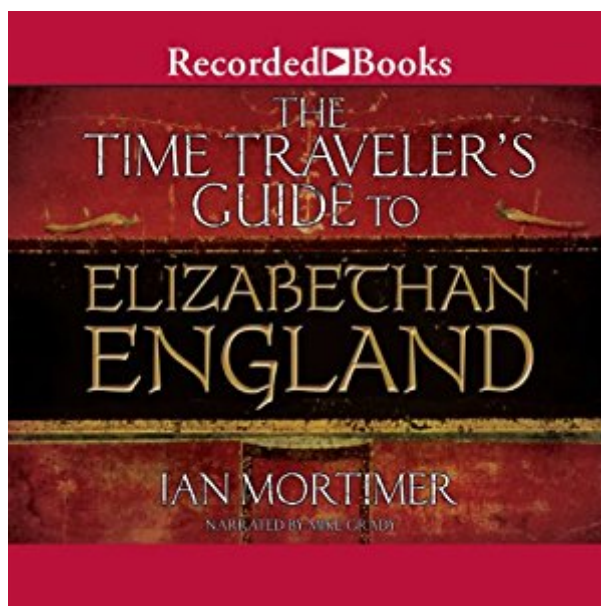

Organized as a travel guide for the time-hopping tourist, *The Time-Traveler's Guide to Elizabethan England* is an entertaining popular history with a twist. Historian Ian Mortimer reveals in delightful (and occasionally disturbing) detail how the streets and homes of 16th century looked, sounded, and smelled for both peasants and for royals; what people wore and ate; how they were punished for crimes and treated for diseases; and the complex and contradictory Elizabethan attitudes toward violence, class, sex, and religion. Mortimer also indulges readers in the lives of literary luminaries such as Shakespeare, Marlowe, and Sir Walter Raleigh.

Having read & used his Medieval book in my college-level Western Civ course (I'm the prof), I was eager to see how this one would stack up. It is great, mostly for one reason: though it covers similar ground, the Elizabethan volume does it differently. Different periods, different approach. Sounds intuitive but I'm sure there was a temptation to replicate the earlier volume as is. Thankfully this is just as fresh as the earlier. Used part of it in class this semester & even jaded college students have really responded to this examination of everyday lives in what pop culture often shows as a soap opera.

Some parts were really interesting esp the food, entertainment and hygiene. I just found some parts really dragging and difficult to follow, esp the part abt clothing. The flow was better though than the medieval edition which took too long with the law chapter. The voice was in general good and light to follow. Recommended for anyone interested in history and culture. Best read in tandem with the

medieval book.

Mortimer states "It is often said of Shakespeare that he is "not of an age but for all time"- a line originally penned by Ben Johnston. But Shakespeare is of an age-Elizabethan England. It makes him. It gives him a stage, a language, and an audience. If Shakespeare is "for all time," then so too is Elizabethan England."

Probably one of the best books on history that I have ever read, and I've read plenty. The depth and thoroughness of the information was outstanding. The language wasn't too complicated, and the conversational tone and frame of reference made it easy to absorb the information and put it into context. The flow of information from chapter to chapter was intuitive with very smooth transitions. I
